<b>Learning outcomes</b>	The purpose of this seminar is to enable students to combine their choice of specialist subject with the opportunity to attend a range of initiatives (lectures, workshops, etc.) of their choosing within the same specialist area. The aim is to provide them with a space for critical reflection on the latest national and international research on the topics that are most relevant for their proposed theses and, at the same time, to encourage them to engage with existing networks and projects in their fields.
<b>Syllabus</b>	There is no pre-established programme for the seminar. The content will be selected in line with the objectives of the course unit, which are to broaden PhD students' perspectives on how to approach the subject-matter of their doctoral theses and to expose them to new interpretations and the latest research results in their fields of interest.
<b>Bibliography (core)</b>	Specific to each lecture topic. To be set by the lecturer and researched by the student.
<b>Bibliography (complementary)</b>	Specific to each lecture topic. To be set by the lecturer and researched by the student.
<b>Evaluation Criteria</b>	The students should aim to take part in 4–6 initiatives over the semester, half of which must be in the field of History. Their proposals must first be approved by the seminar conveners and they must afterwards submit attendance certificates to confirm they have attended.

	<p>The final assessment will consist of an oral presentation and a written report of 3,500–4,500 words that critically analyses what the events attended have added to the students' ideas about the subject-matter of their PhD theses.</p>
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
